We sincerely appreciate making this positive impact on the community possible and for demonstrating the true spirit of mutual support.






## Immigrant Youth Advancement Program Students illuminate the season at "Brighton Center Tree Lighting"

The distribution of Christmas gifts not only symbolizes solidarity during the holiday season but also underscores BWC's ongoing commitment to strengthen and support local communities. The Brazilian Worker Center (BWC) is pleased to share impressive numbers announced by the Massachusetts Registry of Motor Vehicles (RMV) in December. Since the implementation of the Work and Family Mobility Law on July 1st of last year, 54,952 new driver's licenses and 91,961 new learner's permits have been issued, showcasing the importance and validity of this legislation that BWC played a role in

advocating for.

The data reveals a significant increase, highlighting the pressing need for the law. There has been a notable 244% increase in new learner's permits and a 120% increase in new driver's licenses compared to the same period in 2022. Additionally, 33,648 out-of-state driver's license conversions were processed.

Lenita Reason, Executive Director and co-chair of the Driving Families Forward coalition, emphasizes the significant achievement of seeing the Work and Family Mobility Law successfully implemented. She acknowledges the active collaboration of the RMV and the entire Healey-Driscoll administration in this process.

To meet the growing demand, the RMV took proactive measures, including hiring over 250 frontline staff and road test examiners, along with expanding service hours. Additional road test locations were opened in Holyoke, Revere, Cambridge, Franklin, Worcester, and Brockton.

The RMV not only streamlined the process for obtaining a Standard License but also collaborated with groups, communities, and non-profit organizations, demonstrating a collective effort to successfully implement this crucial legislation. The BWC celebrates these achievements and reaffirms its commitment to continue supporting initiatives that benefit the community.



With great joy, the Brazilian Worker Center (BWC) concluded the activities of the Fall 2023 Immigrant Youth Advancement Program on December 21st. In partnership with the Mayor's Office for Immigrant Advancement (MOIA) of the City of Boston, the program held a certificate presentation ceremony for the participants, marking the end of three months of learning and growth.

Over this period, 15 young immigrants received workforce-focused training, engaging in 10 hours of classes per week. This edition of the program innovatively provided an opportunity for students who had previously participated in earlier cohorts to continue refining their theoretical and practical skills.

The program's closure featured student presentations, showcasing projects where they applied techniques learned in classes taught by various professionals throughout the course.

BWC takes pride in contributing to the development of these young individuals and in awarding certifications that represent not only program completion but also the commitment and dedication of the participants. In addition to the acquired knowledge, the youth received materials, nutritional support, and financial assistance as incentives, highlighting the comprehensive approach of the program.

This initiative reinforces BWC's commitment to empowering young immigrants, preparing them for the workforce, and providing opportunities for their development. We congratulate all participants on their achievement and wish them success in their future endeavors.
